School Impact Report

2022 - 2023





It has been a real privilege to complement the innovative and deliberate pastoral interventions taking place across our varied partner schools this 2022-23 academic year.

Supporting the personal development of thousands of students this year has given us an illuminating insight into the perspectives, feelings and priorities of key pupil groups across regions, sectors and age phases.

What is clear is that fostering a sense of confidence, through intentional character-focused interventions, can have a powerful role to play in young people's happiness and skills development. Ensuring pupils feel connected and supported with their school community is more vital than ever as school leaders seek to improve attendance, and ensure successful transitions both into and out of school.

Empowering pupils' oracy is top of the agenda in many of our partner schools' development plans and speaking skills are directly linked to developing self-confidence. We are excited that student-reported data this year has shown how a carefully trained peer or adult mentor can foster pupil oracy over time, through an explicit speaking and listening lens.

We are most grateful for the expertise, trust and collaborative community of practice amongst our partner schools and look forward to exploring together the exciting emerging research this new academic year.

Interview Days

Prep School


The Oppidan Interview Day is a mentoring programme focused on spoken assessment for secondary schools. The ability to engage and talk about yourself with conviction is becoming ever more important as senior schools place increasing emphasis on spoken assessments.

Every pupil has a 30-minute 1:1 interview workshop with an Oppidan mentor. Each workshop looks at mock questions and analysis tasks; children have the opportunity to interview the mentor and a profile is built of each child's strengths and areas to improve.

The data below reflects a sample of 654 students who completed postworkshop surveys last academic year.

Prep School Transition Journey

Prep School

The Prep School Journey provides a five-term transition journey for children in Years 5 & 6 ahead of their senior school assessments and interviews. The process is keenly focused on personal development, helping children succeed well into senior school.

Throughout the journey, pupils engage with inspiring mentors through communication workshops, camp activities, a 1-1 mentoring session, and a 1-1 interview dress rehearsal. The structured journey provides parents with specific information and feedback about their child via an online platform of pupil reports.

The data below reflects a sample of students who have completed a midpoint survey halfway through their schools' 2-year journey. Data from preliminary surveys completed by pupils is used to inform the training the mentors receive and which particular skills should be focused on developing.





Secondary School


We work with schools to provide a Future Pathways workshop, mentoring sixth formers for the challenges beyond school.

This workshop aims to grow pupils' understanding of the core skills that underpin different careers; to build pupil understanding of their own values, skills' strengths and areas to develop; and to develop pupil oracy as a core career skill.


Pupils are encouraged to reflect on their experiences so far and to identify the skills that they have and those that they may need to develop. Pupils learn the importance of communicating their strengths and how to effectively tell their story.



What was the most valuable aspect of the workshop for you?





Oppidan mentors provide training workshops to a cohort of older pupils. These older pupils are trained to be mentors, and are then paired with two KS3 mentees, with two-to-one peer mentoring sessions taking place throughout the school year.


The program aims to foster reciprocal and supportive relationships between pupils from different year groups. These relationships aim to bridge the gap and overcome divisions that can exist in spaces where inter-year interaction is limited - building community and fostering positive relationships across year groups.

The initiative acknowledges the influential role that young people can have on each other within school environments. It seeks to leverage this influence to bring about positive changes in both the mentors and mentees.


How much do you matter to others at your school?




Percentage increase








How valuable have you found the programme overall?




To what extent do you see the benefit of having a mentor?

How much do you matter to others at your school?




Overall, how much do you feel you belong at your school?



The Oppidan Academy


The Oppidan Academy (TOA) is an annual work experience programme for students from schools across the UK.




